

The following teachers submitted information regarding what is happening in their classrooms:

Tracy Dilworth

- My class also participated in the Hour of Code this week. The students learned the basics of "unplugged" programming using block-style coding to get the gingerbread boy to the gingerbread house.
- The kindergarten classes participated in a Gingerbread Exchange. We wrote stories, riddles, and letters and decorated gingerbread people to exchange with students in other states. My class exchanged with a class in Maryland!

Matthew Begley

- 8th grade industrial arts students are getting ready to paint their CO2 dragsters.
- Woodworking students are working on their first project.
- Exploratory students are practicing their welds and turning their riveting hammer handles down on the lathe.
- Special interest students are finishing their second project.

Jeanna Heitkamp

- My 3rd grade students are working on a national monuments/memorials/park project. They will be working on Christmas cards for their pen pals in France and sending a small gift along with their cards-we're looking forward to receiving a similar package from them as well!
- 4th grade TAG math students are just starting their fraction unit. (looking at equivalent fractions/simplest form/etc)
- 5th grade TAG also beginning their fraction unit. (looking at fractions on a number line, estimating/benchmark fractions/eventually multiplying & dividing these)
- 6th grade TAG working with exponential numbers (negative and positive)
- 7th STEM students beginning their bridge unit.
- This month in collaboration (with K-2 students), we discussed the word "Imaginative" and created Christmas cards to be distributed to residents at area nursing homes.

- First grade is still working on learning the keyboard and mouse control.
- 2nd grade just finished Letters to Santa, with adding borders to the page.
- 3rd grade is in the process of making Christmas Cards
- 4th grade is working on a Google Slides Idioms Presentation
- 5th grade is in the middle of an Internet safety unit we are currently talking about cyberbullying, then will talk about talking safely online, and talk about privacy.

Laura Post

5th grade science has been studying force and motion. They recently completed a STEM activity where they built a model of a satellite using limited supplies to represent solar panels, solar cells, and other tools such as cameras and water sensors which needed to be placed on the model. The model had to be indestructible being able to be dropped from a height of 1 meter. Teams then competed to see whose would travel the farthest being powered by a balloon. Students had to record data about the mass, speed, and acceleration of their models.

Andrea Greve

- 6th grade ELA: Students have finished reading "Maniac Magee". Students are completing one-pagers, where they complete a visual representation of all the elements of the story. This is a review of many concepts we have learned this year, including theme, setting, character, and conflict.
- 6th grade STEM: Students just finished a Whirlybird competition. Next, they will be making "Santa Sleigh" prototypes to see which design can hold the most pennies (presents) using a fixed number of supplies.
- 7th grade ELA: Students are finishing their Civil War book studies this week. They have been creating life-size versions of the main character of their book and labeling them with evidence of character traits. They will be writing a paper to compare the historical fiction account to historical facts as their final project of this unit.

6th grade students have been working on an integer timeline that describes their lives. They had to come up with events that happened before and after they were born and had to present the project to their classmates. They found out a lot about positive and negative integers, as well as some family history!

4th grade science has been learning about heat transfer. They have completed several experiments explaining the difference between the heat transfer of convection, conduction, and radiation. Some of these include melting ice with a metal spoon and their hand. In another experiment, the students watched colored water move from warm areas to cooler areas.

- 7th Grade SS recently conducted a Break Out session for our India lesson. It was good to see them attempt this problem solving activity. It was interesting to see how they interacted with each other when it came to solving the puzzles.
- 8th grade just completed a Constitution lesson in which they take the student handbook and they get to dissect it and revise it. They go through the process of a bill turning into a law (Think School House Rock from back in the day.). It is a long and sometimes tedious process but they get to understand what is involved in our law making branch.

In math, the fourth graders completed an hour of coding last week. The students recently learned how to divide a 4-digit dividend by a 1-digit divisor and are currently working on applying their division skills in solving story problems.

Third graders completed their first hour of code last Friday. They experienced logical thinking and problem solving during the activity.

8th grade ELA students have recently finished an argumentative writing unit.

Brad Spettel

- The high marching band had a very eventful Fall season. They received numerous 1st place awards at Local marching band events. Not once were they beaten by another band performing in Class C. The band also received their 3rd Superior Rating at the State Marching Band Finals in the past 3 years. Lastly for the HS band, the students performed at Bands of America- Grand National Championships at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. This was definitely a memorable experience for the group!
- 5th Grade- The 5th grade band students are currently preparing for their very first performance with the band program on Dec. 18th. They've also been working on a new program for beginners called 'Band Karate' in which they perform songs from the book for me to receive their belts. The ultimate goal is to achieve status of Black Belt!
- 6th grade- The 6th grade band has been hard at work learning how to play more music for concert band rather than exercises from the textbook. This is very important because our concert band music requires the students to play different parts and listen to how they fit together.
- Jr. High Band- The Jr. High band has also been busy preparing for the Dec. 18 Christmas concert. This group will present 3 pieces of music written at a higher grade level than 6th grade band and will also performance a piece of music with the High school concert band. There will be approximately 93 performers for the combined tune.
- 5-12 Band and Choir Concert on Monday, Dec. 18th at 7pm! We look forward to performing for the community!

- Kindergarten, First, and Second are busy making Christmas/Winter themed art projects.
- Kindergarten just finished up snowman sculptures and clay Christmas ornaments.
- First grade drew and colored Christmas elves.
- 2nd grade started drawing winter self-portraits that are inspired by Charlie Brown and other characters from the Peanuts comic.
- Third grade is learning about exaggerated forms and are using these to create torn paper masks.
- Fourth grade built penguin sculptures and are decorating them.
- Fifth grade is learning about silhouettes and implied texture. Both are being used to create an animal drawing.
- 6th grade is learning about Pop Art and are making their own Pop Art prints.

Resolution Declaring to be Special Needs District & Submit Bond Issue

- On a separate resolution we will be asking you to approve a resolution declaring Marion Local School District to be a special needs district and applying for consent to submit a bond issue to the electors of this school district at the May 8, 2018 election.
- In order to move forward with a bond levy, this resolution has to be approved by the board of education and submitted to the Tax Commissioner and the Superintendent of Public Instruction along with a statistical report at least 120 days prior to the election which is January 8, 2018.
- If we would decide not to put the bond levy on the May ballot we can either not act upon this resolution or rescind it. However, this resolution is only good for the May 8, 2018 election so if we would choose to go on the ballot at a future election we would have to pass this resolution again before the 120 day deadline for that election.
- Consent is being requested to submit the issuance of bonds to popular vote at the election on May 8, 2018 for the purpose of financing the acquisition, construction, improvement, equipping and furnishing of school facilities in the principal amount of not to exceed \$18 million. We chose this dollar amount based on the \$15-18 million projection provided by Garmann Miller Architects.

Other Informational Items

Proposed Facility Project - Next Steps

After the special needs documentation is submitted, we will need to wait for the approval. After that is received, we will need to pass a resolution of necessity followed by a resolution to proceed. Both of these resolutions must be passed and filed with the Ohio Department of Education and the Ohio Department of Taxation by January 30th in order to comply with the requirements to get special needs district approval. The deadline to submit these resolutions to the Board of Elections for the May 8, 2018 election is February 7, 2018.
