PERFECTION 64-0 Flyers seize 4-peat, 15th State title

CANTON – The Marion Local Flyers got their fairytale finish as they secured their victory against Jeromesville Hillsdale 74-0 to become the Division VII State Champions on Dec. 4 at the Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium in Canton, Ohio. This victory grants the Flyers their 15th OHSAA State title and second 4-peat in school history.

Prior to the game, the spread was listed at 50 points in favor of the Flyers for the State Championship game. The Flyers covered this spread before halftime with a score of 60-0.

In the first half, senior running back Parker Hess tied a state record for most touchdowns scored in a Division VII State Championship game with four rushing touchdowns for four, three, one, and three yards. Hess only ran for a total of 36 yards on five attempts in the first half.

Senior wide receiver and returner Victor Hoelscher also broke the punt return record for

longest return in Division VII history, which he also broke last season in 2023, with a 66-yard return in the first quarter. Hoelscher additionally had a touchdown reception for 37 yards, also in the first quarter.

Senior running back Ethan Heitkamp was responsible for two Flyer touchdowns with carries of one and 12 yards. Heitkamp finished the game with six carries for a total of 57 yards.

Senior quarterback Justin Knouff was the Flyers' leading rusher, with a touchdown run of 60 yards in the first quarter. Knouff completed four of his six passes and had 94 passing yards with one passing touchdown to Hoelscher.

Defensively, the Flyers had five interceptions, setting a Division VII record for most interceptions in a State game. One of the interceptions was taken back for six points by senior safety Griffin Bruns.

With the final score of the matchup against Jeromesville Hillsdale ending 74-0, the Flyers gained their fifth record of the day: the largest shutout in Division VII State Final history.

The Flyers were just shy of a sixth record, most points scored in a State Final game, which is held by another MAC school, Delphos St. Johns. In 2010, against Shadyside, Delphos scored 77 points with the final score being 77-6.

An interesting statistic from the State Championship game was that Marion Local had more yardage from defensive interceptions and special teams returns than total yards on offense

In the championship game alone, the Marion Local Flyers broke five Division VII state records: most touchdowns (Hess), longest punt return (Hoelscher), playoff wins (108), State titles (15), interceptions in a Division VII State game (5), and largest point spread in a Division VII State Final (74).

With all being said and done for the 2024 football season, the Flyers performed above and beyond any prior expectations. The team goal this year was "Chasing Perfection." And they did.

Scholastic Bowl wins MAC

Marion Local was represented by seniors Alex Schulze and Vincent Winner; and juniors John Mescher. Dalton Pohlmann, and Korbin Grady. In addition to the MAC trophy residing proudly in Maria Stein for the upcoming 12 months, the team was awarded a \$300 first-place prize.

2024 was an excellent season for the scholastic bowl club: Varsity were MAC Champions at the tournament and runners-up in the regular season, while JV were regular season champions and took fourth in the tournament. MARIA STEIN - Architects from Garmann Miller created the design, and Touchstone is the project's Construction Manager. In the near future, Touchstone will award contracts to other companies to complete portions of the work, such as electrical and plumbing. Bruns Construction performed the early site work excavation.

The junior high school building will bring many beneficial changes. One such change is the gymnasium, which will have more legroom in the bleachers, wider aisles, chairs for the team and bench, and a 94-foot-long court as opposed to our current 84-foot court. Similar to neighboring schools Minster and St. Henry, the gymnasium in the junior high building will be used for the high school, while the current high school gym will be used for junior high.

The new gymnasium will accommodate more spectators, with approximately 150-200 new seats. The current high school gym seats 1,700-1,750, and the new gym will seat 1,900. Superintendent Mike Pohlman comments, "I am really excited for our junior high athletes because our current high school gymnasium will provide them with a better facility to have quality practices and games while allowing spectators a better viewing experience." This difference will also benefit high school athletes with better facilities and times for their extracurricular activities.

Another benefit of the new building is higher quality locker rooms. Every player on the team will have a locker room in the same location. Also, the distance from the locker room to the football field will be slightly shorter for the players. The girls' locker room will be significantly improved, which will help these athletes practice more efficiently.

For parking, the bus parking lot will be moved to the south side of the new junior high building. Since the new building will be located in the open area between the elementary school and the base ball diamond, the new parking lots will have minor changes. The exact procedure for pick-up and drop-off has yet to be determined, but the drive approaching the building should make it safer for students.

A traffic flow change has already begun at Marion Local because of the construction equipment being brought onto campus. The south drive of the high school is now being used for entry and exit. During this time, every driver must be cooperative and cautious to keep all students and staff safe.

Mr. Pohlman is cheerful about the prospects of the project: "It has been a joy navigating through this process with our community. I enjoyed planning the layout and design with so many different people. I am excited that we have broken ground on the new project, and we can start seeing progress."

Flyer football's fabled finale

CANTON – Securing their 15th State Championship, the Marion Local Flyers capped off a season that was nothing short of historic. The 64-0 Flyers obtained two State records and currently hold the longest active consecutive win streak in American high school football. The two State records obtained are the longest consecutive win streak (previously held by Delphos St. John's at 57-0) and the longest unbeaten streak (previously held by Ironton at 57-0-1).

Another team accolade achieved by the 2024 Flyers was points scored in a season. This was originally held by the 2014 Flyers, at 656, who were, ironically, responsible for the Flyers' first 4-peat in State Championship football. The 2024 Flyers surpassed this record by a staggering 128 points, cementing the new record at 784 points.

With many team accolades achieved, there was one individual school record broken by Flyers' wide receiver senior Victor Hoelscher. Hoelscher broke the Marion Local receptions in a season record, previously held by Troy Homan with 66 receptions during his 2013 season. Hoelscher broke this record by a significant margin with his 71 receptions on the season.

With the season officially over, Flyers who received All-State honors were Drew Lause, Justin Knouff, Carson Bills, Kyle Ungruhn, Victor Hoelscher, and Adam Winner. Lause was also awarded Defensive Player of the Year. Honorable mentions for All-State went to Isaac Muhlenkamp, Parker Hess, Bryant Meier, Ryan Homan, and Colten Ahrens.

Ending their season 16-0 after defeating Jeromesville Hillsdale in the State finals 74-0, the Flyers extended their consecutive win streak that originally began at the start of the 2021 football season to 64 wins.

In the Regional final on Nov. 22 with a quarterback playing through a minor injury, senior Justin Knouff continued to play as if his deep bone bruising simply did not exist. The Flyers came out on top against the Minster Wildcats, who recently got senior James Niemeyer back from injury. The game ended in a grueling shootout of 21-7.

On Nov. 29, the Flyers traveled back to Lima for their State semi-final matchup against Columbus Grove. Due to the cold weather, it was a run-heavy game for both teams, and the final score was 41-6.

Knouff capped off his season with 2161 passing yards on 172 attempts with 123 completions for 27 touchdowns leaving him with a passing percentage of 71.5. As a duel threat, Knouff had used his legs to pick up 663 yards on 70 rushing attempts giving him an average of 9.5 yards per carry, and of those 57 rushes seven resulted in touchdowns.

Moving to an offensive and special teams weapon for the Flyers, senior receiver and returner Victor Hoelscher finished his senior season with a stellar stat line. Hoelscher had 71 receptions for 1308 receiving yards, granting him an average of 18.4 yards per reception with 20 touchdowns. Hoelscher's 71 receptions made up 54 percent of all of the Flyers' passing plays throughout this season.

As a kickoff returner, Hoelscher had 132 yards on seven returns, averaging 18.9 yards per return. As a punt returner, Hoelscher had 11 returns for 179 yards, averaging 16.3 yards per return. In the State final, he set a new punt return record, breaking his previous record from 2023, with a 66-yard return, the longest in Division VII history.

For the Flyers' running back core, senior Parker Hess consistently put up significant numbers deep in the playoffs along with senior two-way player Ethan Heitkamp, who played both running back and linebacker. The last part of the Flyers' running back core was senior Drew Lause, who also played two ways, outside backer and running back.

Heitkamp only recently started to play on both sides of the ball again and made a case for him to keep doing so. As a running back, Heitkamp had 393 yards on 58 carries with 6.8 yards per carry. Heitkamp also had 13 rushing touchdowns as he was mostly used as a bulldozer in fourth and short situations and goal line situations due to the sheer size of him. However, recently Heitkamp was utilized in all situations due to his ability to break tackles and consistently rush for significant yardage.

Hess, unlike Heitkamp, relied more on his speed and agility to get his yards, and it proved to be an effective strategy. Hess had 151 carries for 1129 yards averaging 7.5 yards per carry with 23 touchdowns to end his season. Hess had an injury early on in the season, but when he returned, he became a crucial part of the Flyers' offense throughout the season.

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Hess was also responsible for breaking the rushing touchdown record during the State final game in Canton with four rushing touchdowns in the first half. This was the most by any Division VII running in the State Final in the first half of play.

Drew Lause, a running back who has impressive speed but also the size to operate as a power back, was a key utility player for the Flyers. Lause had 14 rushing touchdowns this season with 387 yards on 62 carries, averaging 6.2 yards per carry. Lause also had four receptions

for 41 yards, averaging 10.3 yards per reception on passing plays. On top of all of this, Lause also received MAC Defensive Player of the Year earlier this season.

The Flyers' offense was a juggernaut this season, putting up a total of 784 points on opponents and 6069 total offensive yards, 2328 passing yards, and 3741 rushing yards. The Flyers' defense, on the other hand, played just as crucial a role in their success. The Flyers' defense held opponents to just 49 points this season. Seven touchdowns, one two-point conversion, two extra points, and one field goal were all that were allowed by the Flyers' defense this season.

Crucial players on the defensive front this season were senior line-backers Bryant Meier and Ethan Heitkamp. Along with them were defensive linemen Isaac Muhlen-kamp and Adam Winner. These four defensive players accounted for one -half of all assisted tackles and one-third of all unassisted tackles for the Flyers this season. These four were also responsible for over 60 percent of sacks this season.

As for crucial defensive players off the ball, these roles were dominated this year by seniors Griffin Bruns (cornerback), Ryan Homan (safety), Daniel Everman (safety), and Drew Lause (outside linebacker). These four seniors were responsible for over 60 percent of the Flyers' interceptions this year, as well as heavily contributing to the substantial lack of big yardage plays against the Flyers this season.

With a season nothing short of extraordinary, the Flyers accomplished many feats with State records and currently hold a national accolade at 64-0 heading into next year. To top it off, the Flyers brought home their OHSAA-recordbreaking 15th State Title to conclude their 2024 football season.

Christmas prep is going well, and Mrs. Claus is doing great. Sorry about the underwear and socks, but last year you probably deserved coal.


