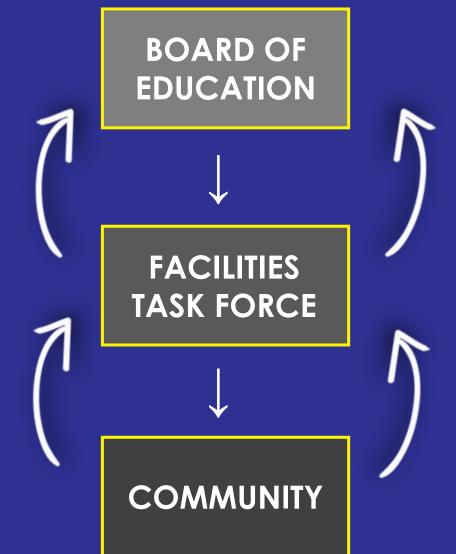

## BOARD OF EDUCATION

Responsibility for management of district facilities and academic delivery. Makes ultimate decision for district direction based on input from the Facilities Task Force.



### FACILITIES TASK FORCE

Identifies priorities, evaluates options and provides the board of education input on future direction of Marion Local Schools.



## COMMUNITY

Provides input and feedback to the Facilities Task Force on priorities and options.



### GARMANN MILLER

Guides Facilities Task Force, co-facilitates community meetings, gives feedback and provides high-level options based on facility priorities.

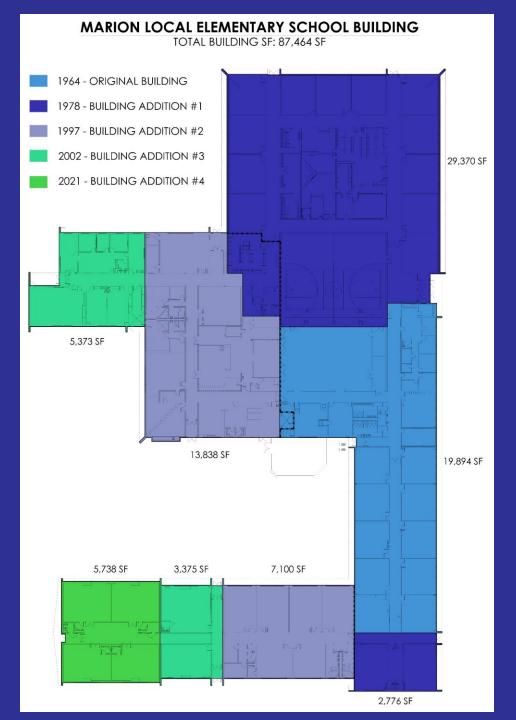

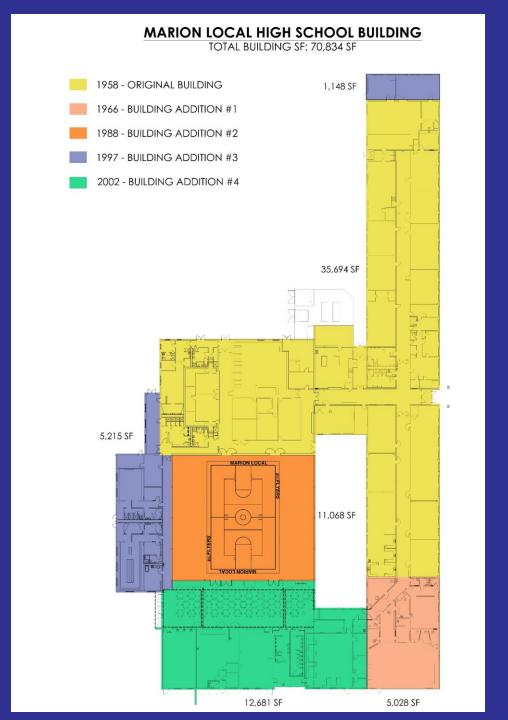

Item E: Plumbing and Fixtures



DHW mixing valve in poor condition

#### Rating: Needs Repair





Rusted and corroded domestic water valve

- Replace domestic water piping – up to 50% blockage; valves corroded
- Only one DWH. New hot water heater(s), storage tanks, recirc pumps
- In general, fixtures in good condition.
- Replace remaining cast iron sanitary in crawl space
- Add sump pumps in crawl space

#### Rating:

Needs Replacement

- Although the current membrane roof system is in fair condition for its age, the roof will not last another 25 years.
- A full roof replacement will be necessary.
- There are also a few locations around the roof perimeter where the metal copings and siding need repair and/or replacement.
- Additional Recommendations:
  - Increase thickness of rigid insulation
  - Add gutters and downspouts

#### Rating: Satisfactory

- There are no recommendations for the aluminum door systems. However, painting of the hollow metal doors should be completed to extend the life and minimize rust and corrosion. This cost will be included in Assessment Item F - Windows.
- Additional Recommendations (to be found in the Ideal/Rec. Cost Assessment)
  - Replace the hollow metal doors and door frames.

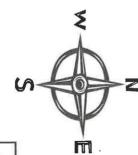

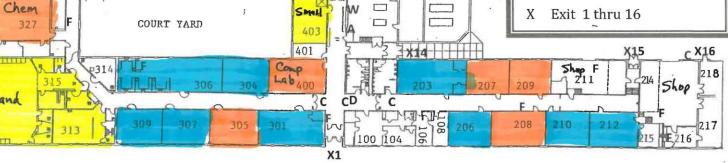

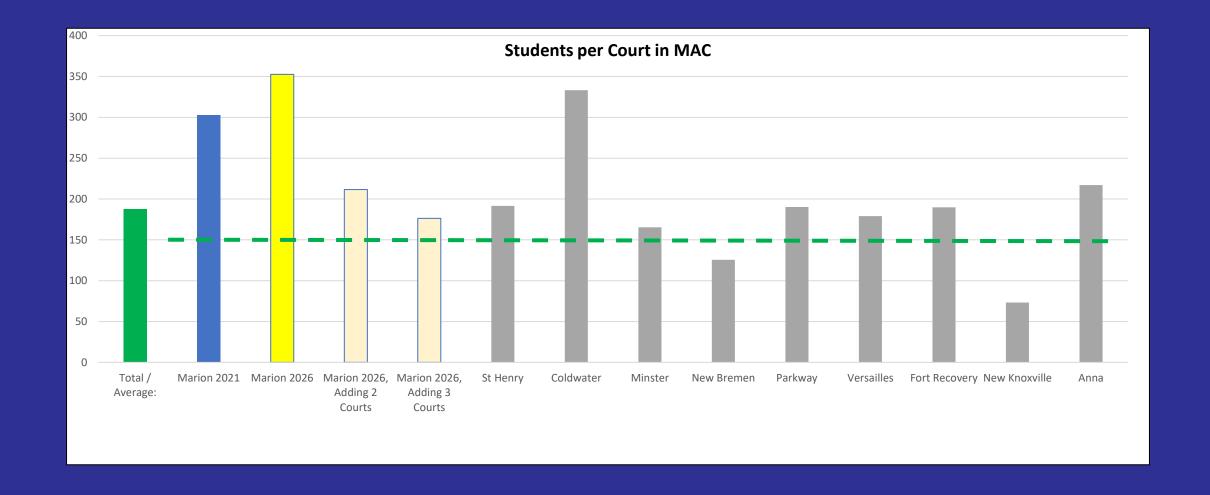

- \$9,477,927 Master Plan budget

**A:** No. In the eyes of OFCC, you completed a District-wide fix. They do not have a plan in place to address repeat clients in your situation.

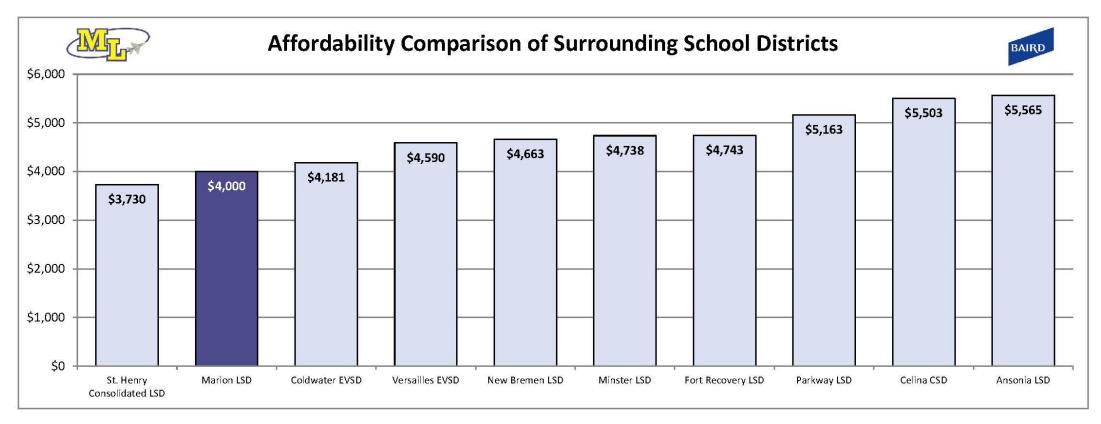
## OFCC
