## Superintendent soon to relocate to high school

MARIA STEIN - The new school levy recently passed in November, and changes are going to be made early this spring. These changes will last until the 2026-2027 school year. The administrative office, which is currently located in the elementary school building, will soon be relocated to the current high school media center
Due to the growing enrollment, the space of the current central office will be converted into two new classrooms.
Superintendent Mike Pohlman explains, "We are currently accepting bids from contractors that are interested in completing this renovation. On Feb. 15, we will open bids and
then make a recommendation to our Board of Education at the March board meeting. We are speculating that the renovation will begin in June and be ready for the ' 24 -' 25 school year."
The library will have a few changes made during this time to accommodate the administrative staff. The circle tables in the middle of the library will be replaced with a large conference table to hold meetings. The entire bookcase on the east wall of the library will be removed and made into cubicle-type offiee spaces for Superintendent's Secretary Lynn Will and Treasurer's Assistant Katie Heitkamp. Mr. Pohlman will be relocated to room 415, which can be found within the library; this used to be the magazine room.

With the administrative staff being

in the library, the library hours will have some changes as well. Positively, the library will be open from 7:30
a.m. until 4:30 p.m. during the school week. Students are still encouraged and able to check out books from the library during this temporary move.
With all this being said, most meetings, tests, events, and storage that were held in the library will also now be moved. Members of Scholastic Bowl and FCA should be aware of location changes. AP tests and possibly Chromebook storage will also no longer be held in the library.

Because of this relocation and construction, school librarian and EMIS Coordinator Mrs. Seger will be relocated to room 418 , which can be found near Mr. Koenig's office off of the stairs behind the gym. Mrs. Seger will be able to be reached in her new office, and students will also be able to get ahold of her via email.
